#### Pomeroy Foundation Historical Marker Dedication for Medal of Honor Recipient

U.S. Army Private Joseph Lonsway, Clayton's only known Civil War Medal of Honor recipient, will be recognized with a William G. Pomeroy Foundation historical marker. The unveiling and dedication, with several direct descendants of Mr. Lonsway in attendance, is Friday, August 2, 2024, at 10:00 AM at St. Mary's Catholic Cemetery, Clayton, New York. Following the dedication, attendees are invited to the Thousand Islands Museum, 312 James Street, for a reception. The marker unveiling and reception are open to the public and all are encouraged to attend.

Organizations participating in the marker unveiling and dedication include the Village Mayor's Office, the Clayton Town and Village Historians Office, the Thousand Islands Museum, the Clayton American Legion Post 821, St. Mary's Catholic Church, and the Walter H. French Camp #17 Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. The dedication will be held rain or shine. If extreme weather, the event will be paused as needed for attendees' safety. Parking along Route 12 may be a concern so plan to carpool where possible. A few chairs will be available for dignitaries and the elderly.

The marker will permanently stand between Joseph's headstone at St. Mary's Cemetery and along Route 12 (McCarn Hill) coming in and out of Clayton Village. Clayton historian Tom LaClair, and Linda Scheler, past director of the Thousand Islands Museum, submitted the marker application in late 2023. The marker was approved in early 2024, went into production, and was received in May 2024.

According to the Pomeroy Foundation, Joseph Lonsway was awarded the Medal of Honor for ensuring the capture of a Confederate fortification in Virginia on October 16, 1864.

Joseph Lonsway was born in Clayton on March 17, 1844, and died in Clayton on January 22, 1925. He was a Private in Company D., 20th New York Volunteers Calvary, serving in Virginia. On October 16, 1864, the rebels captured a lighter belonging to the Union forces, and the officer commanding Private Lonsway's company called for volunteers to swim the Blackwater River and bring back the boat. After five of his comrades had been shot down in the attempt, Private Lonsway stepped forward and declared his intention to try the feat. With his company sending over a protective barrage of shots, and under a returning fire from the enemy's forces on the opposite bank, he swam across the 600-foot stream on his back, with only his face showing above the water, and succeeded in bringing back the lighter. Using this boat, a detachment of Union troops was sent across, after a spirited night engagement captured the rebel breastwork. Mr. Lonsway enlisted at Sackets Harbor on October 12, 1863, and mustered out at Sackets Harbor on July 31, 1865.

**Updated Study Report Meeting Summary** 

Dear Acting Secretary Reese:

Erie Boulevard Hydropower, L.P. (Erie), a Brookfield Renewable company, is the Licensee, owner, and operator of the Black River Project (P-2569), Beebee Island Project (P-2538), and Beaver River Project (P-2645), collectively referred to as the "Projects." The Projects were relicensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC or Commission) in 1996 and these licenses expire in 2026. In support of preparing an application for new licenses for the Projects, Erie has elected to use the Integrated Licensing Process (ILP), as defined in 18 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) Part 5 of the Commission's regulations. In accordance with 18 C.F.R. § 5.15(c)(3), Erie is filing herewith a summary of the Updated Study Report (USR) Meeting that was held on June 20, 2024.

On June 28, 2022, the Commission issued a Study Plan Determination (SPD) for the Projects. Pursuant to 18 C.F.R. § 5.15(f), Erie filed the USR for the Project on June 10, 2024. In accordance with the Commission's regulations at 18 C.F.R. § 5.15(c)(2), the USR Meeting was held within 15 days of filing the USR; the meeting was held at the Croghan Fire Hall on June 20, 2024 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The Commission's regulations at 18 C.F.R. § 5.15(c)(3) require Erie to file this summary of the USR Meeting, including any proposed modifications to ongoing studies or new studies proposed by the Licensee, within 15 days of the USR Meeting.

## 1.0 Purpose and List of Participants

#### 1.1 Purpose

The Commission's SPD and November 9, 2023 Study Modification Determination (SMD) directed Erie to conduct the following studies in support of relicensing the Projects (including sub studies of the Habitat Characterization and River Conditions Study):

- Cultural Resources Study Architectural Survey
- Cultural Resources Study Phase IA Literature and Sensitivity Review
- Beaver Lake Impacts Evaluation Study
- Existing Minimum Flow Demonstration Study at the Beaver River Project

- Level 2 Whitewater Study at Beaver River Project Soft Maple Development

#### 1.2 Participants

On May 24, 2024, and concurrent with the June 10, 2024 filing of the USR, resource agencies, tribes, non-governmental organizations, and other interested parties were invited to participate in the USR Meeting. ## 2.0 Summary of USR Meeting

Steve Murphy (Erie) provided an introduction to the meeting, including meeting participants, Erie's relicensing team, the purpose of the meeting, an overview of the relicensing process, study activities conducted to date, and ILP milestones.

A copy of the USR Meeting presentation is included as Attachment A to this USR Meeting Summary.

AW noted that the way the ILP schedule is structured, not all studies will be completed when the Final License Application (FLA) is filed. In the past, on other hydropower relicensing projects, AW has been unable to provide comments on the FLA as there is not a formal comment process for the FLA. AW clarified that they will file comments even if there is not a formal process as per the ILP. Erie responded that it is common to file the FLA with a few studies ongoing—the Licensee does what they can to adhere to the ILP schedule, but unforeseen factors can cause study delay. Erie noted that stakeholders can file comments at any time.

As stated in the USR, Erie is not proposing any modifications to ongoing studies approved in the Commission's SPD or SMD. Erie noted that stakeholders or FERC may file comments on the USR Meeting summary, request modifications to ongoing studies, or request new studies on or before August 8, 2024. If requesting modifications to ongoing studies, stakeholders must follow FERC's Criteria for Modification of Approved Studies (18 C.F.R. § 5.15(d)). If requesting new studies, stakeholders must follow FERC's Criteria for New Study (18 C.F.R. § 5.15(e)).

#### 2.1 Beaver River Spring Fisheries Survey

Erie presented the status of the Beaver River Spring Fisheries Survey, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- NYSDEC asked if minnow traps were baited with wet or dry food during the Eagle Impoundment sample dates. Erie clarified that both wet and dry food were used as bait during sampling.
- NYSDEC asked if summer suckers (Catostomus utawana) were identified or labeled as white
  suckers (Catostomus comersonii) as the NYSDEC manages summer suckers as an independent
  species, and if lengths and weights of sampled suckers be provided. Erie noted that white suckers
  were identified, but weights and length were not collected during field efforts as suckers are not
  managed as a game species and was not part of the study plan.

#### 2.2 Black River Fall Fisheries Survey

Erie presented the status of the Black River Fall Fisheries Survey, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- The NYSDEC noted a potential mislabeled fish noting that it was identified as a Smallmouth Bass (*Micropterus dolomieu*) but thought to be a Largemouth Bass (*Micropterus salmoidies*). Erie noted that they do not think the fish was mislabeled and was properly identified as a Smallmouth Bass in the report.
- The NYSDEC requested clarification related to a potential sturgeon and American eel being observed on trashracks within the Project boundary. Erie stated that there have been no sightings of sturgeon within the Black River/Beebee Island Project boundary. Erie's operators are well-trained and know to report if they had observed anything unusual.

• NYSDEC noted they think that the sturgeon and American eel sightings should have been included in this study report. Erie clarified that it was not in the study plan to document sightings of various fish in the Project area, or in the vicinity of the Project. Erie noted though that the American eel observations were included in the American Eel Survey Report and reiterated that it is unlikely the sturgeon sightings occurred at the Projects.

### 2.3 Macroinvertebrate Survey

Erie presented the status of the Macroinvertebrate Survey, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- AW asked if macroinvertebrates prefer higher flows in the bypassed reach. Erie responded that
  based on the similar BAP profiles from the impoundment, bypassed reach, and tailrace, there is little
  indication that the current minimum flows are not sufficient for macroinvertebrates.
- NYSDEC noted that certain multiplates were lost/irretrievable. Erie described the nuances of
  constructing and deploying the multiplate in high velocity areas, giving insight to the loss of
  multiplates in some locations. The velocities cause the multiplate to twist and turn loosening the
  turnbuckles.
- NYSDEC questioned the lack of ponar grabs in impoundments that were noted to have bedrock substrate and asked if a kicknet could have been utilized. Erie stated that multiplates were placed in impoundments to supplement the lack of ponar grabs. With all data collected between the water quality study and the macroinvertebrate survey the Beaver River was well-blanketed.
- NYSDEC indicated they will likely ask for additional sampling in select locations where one or no samples were collected. FERC stated that their determination will be made in October, past the field season for the year, and that NYSDEC and Erie may want to consult with each other for additional sampling to be performed in 2024. Erie reiterated they consider existing information to be sufficient, but they can discuss with NYSDEC.

#### 2.4 Freshwater Mussel Survey

Erie presented the status of the Freshwater Mussel Surveys, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

### 2.5 Water Quality Monitoring Survey

GSE presented the status of the Water Quality Monitoring Survey, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

AW asked for clarification on how survey sites were determined at selected locations. Erie
responded that sites were determined based on multiple factors including shoreline location access,
land ownership, and safety considerations.

- FERC inquired on instances of low dissolved oxygen and why these may have occurred. G&S described these results were due to lack of flow in some locations since the monitors were installed at high water and then flows lowered through the summer.
- NYSDEC requested clarification on any rejected/adjusted data. GSE responded that a Quality
  Assurance Quality Control (QAQC) Plan was developed based on the calibrated YSI used to collect
  in-situ water quality and if needed data was adjusted accordingly as per the QAQC Plan.
- AW asked for additional information on the selection of the intakes as a sample location, stating that if developments are not operating that could obscure data being collected. GSE indicated the intakes were selected as this was the water going through the project, as well as for access reasons.
- AW asked for clarification on locations of water quality profiles. HDR described that the locations were collected at the deepest part of the reservoir.
- FERC asked if flow data was included on the discrete water quality tables. GSE did not include flow data in the tables but included it in the continuous monitoring tables.
- NYSDEC asked for clarification as to why data was rejected at the Deferiet bypassed reach. GSE
  stated that the area was a shallow and rocky area and this resulted in a logger being lost and unsafe
  conditions for a replacement to be installed.
- AW asked what can be done to mitigate pH issues on the Beaver River. Erie and NYSDEC
  discussed how the pH issues in the Beaver River are a region-wide issue with acid rain and
  pollution. NYSDEC noted that the pH in the impoundments is lower than the pH in the bypassed
  reaches, so increased flow from the impoundments will further lower pH in the bypassed reaches.
  NYSDEC stated that they find it optimistic that there is improvement in pH compared to previously
  collected water quality data.

#### 2.6 Cultural Resources Study - Architectural

Erie presented the status of the Cultural Resources Survey, summarized study methods, and described available study results.

- AW asked if Indian tribes were consulted during the course of the study. Erie confirmed that
  outreach to tribes was performed as part of the study and through the relicensing. Erie initiated
  consultation during development of the PAD and through the ILP process. Saint Regis Mohawk
  Tribe indicated they were not interested in participating in this relicensing. Indian tribes are
  included on all distributions if they want to be engaged in the future.
- FERC stated that they offer tribes multiple ways to get involved in relicensings. FERC explained if interest is shown efforts will be made to ensure involvement into the process.

#### 2.7 Recreation Study

Erie presented the status of the Recreation Study, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- AW asked about the location of the trail counter at the Taylorville Development. Erie clarified that it was under the penstock at the start of the Fisherman's Access trail.
- FERC asked for clarification on how the QR code worked for the user survey portion of the study. If
  cellphone service was available, the QR code took the user to the survey. Erie explained that by
  taking a picture of the QR code, the QR code could be used offline and could be accessed when
  there was cell phone service/internet. There were typically multiple QR codes posted at each
  development. Erie stated that the survey asked the users to identify the development and recreation
  resource being utilized.
- AW noted that the survey was not clear that multiple surveys could have been submitted. The
  survey allowed the users to complete the survey for one development at a time. Survey participants
  may not have realized they can take it again to provide feedback for another development.
- AW was concerned that whitewater was underrepresented in the recreation study and report. Erie clarified that the Level 1 Whitewater Study was filed with the ISR and that report was meant to provide high representation to the whitewater community. The Recreation Study was meant to look at all recreation in the Projects' boundary. Erie had a separate survey issued for the Level 1 Whitewater Study. There were separate QR codes posted targeted to the whitewater boaters and available to access by the start of the whitewater releases in 2022.

### 2.8 Existing Minimum Flow Demonstration Study - Beaver River

Erie presented the status of the Existing Minimum Flow Demonstration Study, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

NYSDEC believes additional flows in the High Falls bypassed reach may be beneficial.

### 2.9 Controlled Flow Whitewater Boating Study at the Deferiet Development

Erie presented the status of the Controlled Flow Whitewater Boating Study at the Deferiet Development, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

AW asked for additional information on the gate structure at Deferiet. Erie explained they operate
the bladder gates and discussed what the possibility would be for lowering both bladder gates to
increase whitewater opportunity. Erie reiterated they still need to maintain the 1,000 cfs baseflow
through the powerhouse.

- AW noted that this stretch has not been boated before and that brought a level of safety concerns to the run. They noted plenty of challenges but a fun run and surprised at the amount of opportunity present at the high flow and was well within the intermediate skill range.
- AW noted that the study was professionally and thoroughly performed.
- AW noted that many of the boaters who participated in the study were experienced boaters, and that was possibly why results indicated the reach was appropriate for beginners or novice boaters.

#### 2.10 Beaver Lake Impacts Evaluation Study

Erie presented the status of the Beaver Lake Impacts Evaluation Study, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- Beaver Lake residents questioned if the model used was compared with the data of the study year.
   Erie confirmed that the model considered the operation capacity of the Eagle Development and was compared against data collected during the study year. The Beaver Lake residents questioned if the model could be trusted since it was a simulation of conditions, not fully based on existing Project conditions or collected data. It was discussed whether Erie could remove the flashboards to validate the HEC-RAS model and collect additional information.
- Beaver Lake residents explained the history of Beaver Lake as they recall it prior to the
  implementation of flashboards in the 1970s. Erie responded that the Project was operated differently
  back then—the Licensee could drain Moshier/Eagle reservoir five feet during the summer. Today,
  Erie is limited to the fluctuations allowed by the current license which does not allow Erie to pull
  the reservoirs down so low.
- NYSDEC asked for the elevation of the constriction and Erie confirmed that the information was
  provided within the report. Beaver Lake residents questioned the existence of the constriction.
  HDR/Erie noted that the 1974 Analysis, the recent ADCP work and the cross sections that were
  developed from this effort confirm the presence of a constriction.
- Beaver Lake residents requested the acreage of Beaver Lake itself. Erie noted that could likely be provided.
- Beaver Lake residents discussed the effects of the Eagle flashboards as they have observed and questioned the legality of having installed the flashboards in the 1970s. Erie noted that flashboards at Eagle were installed at the request of Beaver Lake residents. Erie acknowledged that it is unclear what approval steps were taken when the Eagle flashboards were installed in the 1970s but reiterated that the Eagle flashboards were incorporated into the current license and are a licensed Project component today.

- Beaver Lake residents provided a data printout of the Erie's gage showing Beaver Lake water elevations. Beaver Lake residents implied the water level changes observed in the data printout were due to Project operations at Eagle. The period of record for the data printout was April 30, 2024 May 17, 2024, during implementation of Erie's Low Flow Augmentation Plan.
- NYSDEC stated that Eagle development may have some gray effect on Beaver Lake, but the non-Project Stillwater Development seems to have a greater impact.
- AW suggested that the HEC-RAS be provided and made available to Beaver Lake residents.
- Beaver Lake residents want a study to compare the current operations to historical operations during the 1950s and 1960s. Erie stated that they cannot operate the Project as they did in the 1950s and 1960s, NYSDEC and other agencies would not allow that, so such a study would be fruitless.
- AW suggested that Mr. Mueller file an additional information request on the docket. NYSDEC and FERC agreed with this suggestion.

### 2.11 Black River Development Walleye Spawning Study

Erie presented the status of the Black River Development Walleye Spawning Study, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

NYSDEC asked for clarification on Table 5 of the report that stated two females were spent but
called out in the table as hard. Erie indicated that they recall two females were hard. After the USR
meeting, Erie reviewed the Black River Development Walleye Spawning Study and confirmed that
two hard females were found in the downstream reach.

## 2.12 American Eel Survey at the Beebee Island Development

Erie presented the status of the American Eel Survey, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- NYSDEC asked for clarification on if the four eel observations were the same eel or separate eels.
   Erie was moderately confident that two observations were of the same eel based on size and observation location.
- FERC stated that eel access to the Beebee Island south channel comes from the downstream non-project related Glen Park Project and Dexter project, which have upstream passage installed. Erie noted that eel likely use those passage structures although they were not designed to pass eels.
- NYSDEC and Erie discussed the incidental observation of eels on the trashracks following high
  flow events two weeks apart at the Herrings and Kamargo Developments. Erie noted they are not
  aware of any other eel observations at the Black River Project or Beebee Island Project.

#### 2.13 Desktop Downstream Fish Passage and Site Reconnaissance Study

Erie presented the status of the Desktop Downstream Fish Passage and Site Reconnaissance Study, summarized study methods, and described the study results.

- NYSDEC recalled broken concrete at the Moshier Development and asked if it showed up in any
  design drawings. Using the photographs and drawings on screen, Erie showed the layout of the
  downstream fish passage route at the Moshier Development.
- AW asked why there was no fish passage at the Soft Maple Development. Erie stated that was
  decided as part of Settlement during the last relicensing to prevent mixing of cold and cool water
  fish. AW asked why Beaver River is managed as a trout fishery if no trout were caught during the
  survey. NYSDEC explained that it is a long process to change stream designations.
- NYSDEC asked for additional information related to the south channel pipe at the Beebee Island Project. Erie stated that there is a set of racks in front of the pipe.
- AW asked if there is an assumption that a trashrack approach velocity of less than 2 ft/s limits fish
  entrainment. Erie stated that it is variable as each species has a different sustained speed and burst
  speed, but most resident fish would have burst speed higher than 2ft/s and so would move when
  they feel the acceleration in front of the trashracks.
- NYSDEC asked why the Sewalls Development does not have the 1-inch clear seasonal trashrack overlay. Erie stated its due to operations issues like flow and velocity, and site configuration.

#### 2.14 Discussion of Upcoming ILP Milestones

- Erie discussed the upcoming milestones under the ILP as well as the remaining outstanding studies. The four outstanding studies are:
  - o Level 2 Whitewater Study at Beaver River Project Soft Maple Development
  - o Level 2 Whitewater Study at Black River Project Sewalls Development
  - o Cultural Resources Study Phase IA Literature and Sensitivity Review
  - Desktop Downstream Fish Passage and Site Reconnaissance Study
- Erie indicated the fieldwork is complete for the Level 2 Whitewater Study at Black River Project Sewalls Development. The Cultural Resources Study – Phase IA Literature and Sensitivity Review Report is nearly finalized.
- Erie noted that field efforts associated with the Level 2 Whitewater Study at the Beaver River
   Project Soft Maple Development and the Desktop Downstream Fish Passage and Site
   Reconnaissance Study are dependent on appropriate flows being available. Erie noted that they were

hoping to perform the field effort for the Level 2 on June 21, 2024 (the day after the USR meeting) but the flows on the Beaver River were not suitable. Similarly, Erie is waiting for flows on the Black River and Beaver River to match normal conditions to perform the site visit associated with the Desktop Downstream Fish Passage and Site Reconnaissance Study.

- Erie noted that they intend to file the remaining study reports within 60 days of completion of the field activities.
- FERC noted that since there are four study reports to be filed by Erie, FERC will likely issue a formal deadline and deadline for comment so that all stakeholders are working from the same schedule, and there is no confusion on when comments from stakeholders are due.

#### 3.0 Conclusion

Erie is filing this USR Meeting summary in accordance with 18 C.F.R. § 5.15(c)(3) of the Commission's regulations. Erie is not proposing any modifications to any of the studies at this time, nor is Erie proposing any new studies. After review of the USR Meeting summary, stakeholders may file disagreements with the meeting summary, request modifications to ongoing studies, or request new studies. Disagreements with the USR meeting summary and any requests to amend the study plan to include new or modified studies must be filed with the Commission on or before August 8, 2024. In requesting modifications to ongoing studies or new studies, stakeholders must follow the Commission's Criteria for Modification of Approved Study (18 C.F.R. 5.15(d)) or Criteria for New Study (18 C.F.R. 5.15(e)).

Erie will have 30 days to respond to any disagreements or requests to amend the study plan, and the Commission's Director of the Office of Energy Projects will resolve any disagreement and amend the approved study plan, as appropriate, within 30 days of the due date for Erie's response.

WHEREAS, the Project is a Type 1 Action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and the regulations promulgated therewith ("SEQR") but the Town Board has elected to conduct a Coordinated Review; and

WHEREAS, at regular meeting of this Board held on June 12<sup>th</sup>, 2024 Part I of the Long Form EAF was duly accepted for filing by this Board, this Board declared itself lead agency for the SEQR review, and directed the Town Engineer to circulate that notice together with Part I of the EAF to the other involved agencies; and

WHEREAS, by letters dated June 17<sup>th</sup>, 2024 Part I of the EAF was forwarded to each of the other involved agencies this board has either received the consent of the other involved agencies to serve as lead agency, or more than thirty (30) days have elapsed; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 6 NYCRR part 617, this Board has reviewed Part II of the Long Form EAF to determine whether the Project will have a significant effect on the environment; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article VIII of the Environmental Conservation Law and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto by the Department of Environmental Conservation, to wit: 6 NYCRR Part 617, this Board has determined that the Action will not have a significant effect on the environment, and will not cause a significant impact on the environment, and therefore, the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement is not required.

### BOND RESOLUTION DATED JULY 24<sup>TH</sup>, 2024

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SERIAL BONDS OR A STATUTORY INSTALLMENT BOND IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$3,500,000, THE PROCEEDS OF WHICH ARE TO BE USED FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW SEWAGE COLLECTION SYSTEM TO SERVICE THE NYS ROUTE 12 SEWER WEST DISTRICT.

**BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Town Board of Clayton, Jefferson County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Town Board of Clayton the interest of the citizens of the Town of Clayton finds that it is necessary for the construction of a new sewage collection system to be known as NYS Route 12 Sewer West District including, but not limited to new sewer mains, laterals, pump stations, and sewage plant upgrades. The estimated cost of such project as determined by St. Lawrence Engineering, DPC, the engineers hired by the Town of Clayton is \$3,500,000.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid construction is forty (40) years, pursuant to subdivision 1 of paragraph (a) of section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is further determined that no down payment is required pursuant to Section 107(d)(3)(a) of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. The Town Supervisor, is further authorized to sell all or a portion of the Bonds to the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation ("EFC") and/or the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Development ("Rural Development") in the form prescribed in one or more financing, grant, or similar agreements (the "Financing Agreements") between the Town and the EFC and/or Rural Development; to execute and deliver on behalf of the Town one or more Financing Agreements with EFC and/or Rural Development and to execute such other documents, and take such other actions, as are necessary or appropriate to obtain financing from the EFC and/or Rural Development for all Town's obligations under its Bond delivered to EFC and/or rural Development and the Financing Agreements. The Supervisor is further authorized to seek grant funding from such New York State or federal grant programs deemed appropriate and to deliver on behalf of the Town one or more Financing Agreements with the appropriate entities/agencies and to execute such documents, and take such other actions, as necessary or appropriate to obtain financing for all or a portion of the costs of the expenditures authorized by this Bond Resolution.

<u>Section 4</u>. The faith and credit of said Town of Clayton, Jefferson County, New York are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall become due and

payable. Annual tax revenue shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of, and interest on, such bonds becoming due and payable in such year.

All other matters, except as provided herein relating to such bonds, Section 5. including determining whether to issue such bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service and all other matters related thereto, prescribing whether to manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bond are to be executed in the name of the Town by the facsimile signature of its Town Supervisor), including the consolidation with other issues shall be determined by the Town Supervisor. It is hereby determined that it is to the financial advantage of the Town not to impose and collect from registered owners of such bonds any charges for mailing, shipping and insuring bonds transferred or exchanged by the fiscal agent, and accordingly, pursuant to paragraph c of Section 70.00 of the Local Finance Law, no such charges shall be collected by the fiscal agent. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Town Supervisor shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- (1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- (2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit, or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- (3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

<u>Section 7</u>. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same be published in full in the Thousand Islands Sun, the official newspaper of said Town for such purpose, together with a notice

of the Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 8.</u> This Resolution is subject to permissive referendum, pursuant to Section 35 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 9. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for the purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are or are reasonably expected to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.
